From the Principal's Desk

I've made a few mistakes in my time (I'd say well into the tens of thousands by now), and one thing that I know, is that it's far easier to cope with a mistake if we feel safe to make it. Sometimes, mistakes result in better outcomes than the original plan. A great example is the Post-It note. 3M Corporation insured that their engineers and scientists felt safe to make mistakes. The leaders knew that creativity and innovation requires a willingness to try new things. Post-it notes (those sticky notes that you can put on a piece of paper and pull it off without tearing the paper) were born of a mistake. The intent was to make a super adhesive, but the scientists accidentally discovered an adhesive that was reusable. Rather than pushing the mistake aside, the scientists put the adhesive on pads of paper and sent the pads out to the office workers to see what they thought. In no time, the lab was getting orders for more and more pads of paper.

Some of our students are very nervous about making mistakes. That is unfortunate, because we learn more from mistakes than we do from getting everything right. Having to puzzle through things requires us to stretch our thinking. Some children are afraid that whatever they do must be perfect. Perfectionism can be a real barrier to trying new things and improving, especially when children refuse to even try, because they know they may not be successful in their first attempts.

The good news is that we have learned that making mistakes is the best path to learning; that it forces us to use our brains more, and in different ways. Mistakes actually help us grow more synapses and if we are doing a lot of different things as we are learning, we can actually increase our IQ. Focus on being correct is not as important as working to solve a problem that is really puzzling. Ultimately, we hope for a correct answer, but if it doesn't happen immediately, that should not be a cause for concern or undermine our belief in our ability to get to a good solution.

I think that we all can agree that we don't expect kids to be perfect. No one's perfect, least of all children. The thing is, children need to feel safe making mistakes. There are three things we can do that will help children to feel safe to try new things. The first thing is to reassure them that mistakes are just part of the learning process; that it often takes many tries before someone is able to do something really well. The important thing is trying. The second thing we can do is model making a mistake. This can be done in a "matter of fact" way - "Oh look, I made a mistake. I'll just have to try again." We can laugh at ourselves. If we can show them that we make mistakes, we've paved the way for helping them to feel safe to make a mistake. More importantly, we've paved the way
